ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING GUEST SPEAKER Linda Emery




Linda Emery is a freelance historian and author, with a particular research interest in 19th century Australian history. She is Archivist and Vice President of the Berrima District Historical & Family History Society and from 2017-2023 was a Councilor of the Royal Australian Historical Society. She has published a number of books on the history of the Southern Highlands of NSW where she lives and promotes history in regular articles for the Southern Highlands lifestyle magazine *Highlife*.

Between 2008 and 2018, Linda was a member of the research team for the SBS television program *Who Do You Think You Are*, a researcher for the 2018 ABC series, *Monash and Me* and more recently has undertaken research for the SBS television series *Every Family has a Secret*.

Linda is a member of the Molong Historical Society and has several connections in the area.

From Ireland to Molong via India



The Toohey Family of Amaroo

Born in Ireland in 1840, Martin Toohey led an adventurous life before settling in Amaroo with his Indian born wife Sarah and their family in 1886. He joined the British Army in 1858 and spent most of his career in India. He was a member of the armed force which was sent from India to Abyssinia in 1868 in one of the most remarkable, and costly, expeditions ever mounted by the British Army. Martin had joined the NSW railways in about 1880 and spent the rest of his working life 'on the tracks'.

The History of 'APRONS' I don't think most kids today know what an apron is.

I don't think most kids today know what an apron is. The principle use of Mom's or Grandma's apron was to protect the dress underneath because she only had a few. It was also because it was easier to wash aprons than dresses and aprons used less material. But along with that, it served as a potholder for removing hot pans from the oven.

It was wonderful for drying children's tears, and on occasion was even used for cleaning out dirty ears. From the chicken coop, the apron was used for carrying eggs, fussy chicks, and sometimes half-hatched eggs to be finished in the warming oven.

When company came, those aprons were ideal hiding places for shy kids.. And when the weather was cold, she wrapped it around her arms. Those big old aprons wiped many a perspiring brow, bent over the hot wood stove. Chips and kindling wood were brought into the kitchen in that apron.

From the garden, it carried all sorts of vegetables. After the peas had been shelled, it carried out the hulls. In the fall, the apron was used to bring in apples that had fallen from the trees. When unexpected company drove up the road, it was surprising how much furniture that old apron could dust in a matter of seconds.



When dinner was ready, she walked out onto the porch, waved her apron, and the men folk knew it was time to come in from the fields to dinner.



It will be a long time before someone invents something that will replace that 'old-time apron' that served so many purposes.

REMEMBER:

Mom's and Grandma's used to set hot baked apple pies on the window sill to cool. Her granddaughters set theirs on the window sill to thaw.

They would go crazy now trying to figure out how many germs were on that apron. I don't think I ever caught anything from an apron - but love more:

MOLONG IN THE 70's A GLANCE THROUGH OLD FILES

A selection of articles found in a 1903 Express that relates to Molong in 1877.

From Molong Express Saturday 7th March 1903 issue

APRIL 6th, 1877

The Rev W.W. Rudledge preached his farewell sermon in the Molong Wesleyan Church on Sunday last. He left for his new district, Paddington, on the following day.

......

Speaking at a railway meeting on Wednesday, Mr. J Smith J.P of Gamboola said ament the disinclination to allow Mr. Long to participate in the Great Western Railway: "Twenty years hence, when Circuit Courts are hold in Molong, the gigantic blunder will be apparent enough. It will be asked why the line of population was avoided, and the answer will be that a squatter named Smith was the owner of some land near Molong and was consequently the Ministers of the day would not take the line there lest they should confer some benefit to Smith."

..... APRIL 13th 1877

The country between Molong and Buckinbah has a most desolate and desert like appearance, nothing green meeting the eye in the bush except the bluish green of the eucalyptus. Some cattle and sheep are in very low condition.

Despite the dry season, Mr Sherringham of Norwich Farm has harvested a fine yield of 30 bushels to the acre and Mr Meredith of Yullundry 40 bushels to the acre.

The dedication service was held during the Bi-annual Reunion of the Old Fairbridgeans Association in 1998 which celebrated 60 years of the Farm. At this Reunion, the renovated "Chocolate Bomb" bus was another highlight.

Well-known Molongite, Lorna Boucher, run "KIMROL POTTERY and WHIS-TLESTOP EATERY" during the 1990's, which sold pottery and other items.

Her husband James "Micky" Boucher arrived at Fairbridge in 1944 after spending time at Northcott Victoria, with his brothers Arthur and Frank.
