REMEMBERING RUTH

It was sad to hear that another Foundation member of the Society passed away at Prunus Lodge on 7th May 2026.



Ruth Agnes Bloomfield, aged 96, born in Molong and lived on the family property "KIRKBEAN" until moving into Molong in the 1960's where she lived until moving to Prunus Lodge recently. Ruth was a member of the BLOOMFIELD family who came to Molong district in 1836 and are well known in farming, social and local sectors.

Ruth was the second child born to Cyril (Jim) and Florence (Bloomfield) Bloomfield, a sister to Warren, on the 12th of January 1930. Her early life was spent on the family property "Kirkbean", and she attended Bridgewater School. Ruth stayed on the property assisting with the farm work. Ruth and Warren were the only family members with a driver's license and quickly became the main driver. In the 1960 the family moved into Molong and purchased a home in Edward St, where she lived until 2024. Ruth was able to get a job and was more involved in many community groups. For 10 years, Ruth delivered mail on the Euchareena/Larras Lee run. Ruth assisted her cousin Norm publishing the "Molong Express" each week. Ruth and her parents attended the horse races every Saturday and travelled to Orange, Parkes and Wellington for local meetings. Ruth enjoyed travelling and rarely missed the New Year cricket test and the NSW Tennis Open.

She was involved in several community organizations, helping throughout her life. She was a Life Member of the Annual Sheep dogs' trials for 50 years (missing only one year) usually would be found in the canteen.

Ruth was Life member of the Show Society and could be found in the Main Pavilion stewarding in several sections. The Molong Show was a highlight on Ruth's calendar, and she would have entries in the garden, photography and cooking sections.

Ruth (middle row third) and members of her family attended the early meetings of the Historical Society and were 1965 foundation members. Ruth was awarded Life Membership in 2012 for her years of service to the group. Ruth would be seen in the kitchen assisting and in the general running of the museum. Ruth was very quiet, but she enjoyed passing on stories of her life in Molong. She remained active until COVID hit, when she found it difficult to get out. Ruth always looked forward to receiving her copy of our newsletter and catching up with members.



Ruth was an avid gardener and had a stunning garden. She spent hours in her yard and reaped the benefits of her extensive vegetable garden. She often attended trips with the Molong Garden Club. She was a dedicated member of the Anglican Church and was often found preparing the church for services and special events. She was talented at flower arranging and would make the arrangement spectacular regardless of what flowers were available.

HELP WITH RESEARCH

Recently we had an enquiry trying to find out the origins of a street name. We were unable to assist at the time, so I am putting it out to our readers.

BUNDELLA CLOSE a small street located near the Mitchell Highway, close to the Ambulance Station.

The enquirers believe it may mean "two creeks" but I have been unable to prove this. Our researcher believes it may be connected to a business that was set up at the end of the street in an old corn paddock, facing Riddell Street.

There is a village near Tamworth with that name (? any connection)
(From Wiki. Surname associated with BUNDELLA clan of India.)

UPDATE ON FAIRBRIDGE COTTAGE RESEARCH

In 2017, the Old Fairbridgians Association were asking: What has happened to the cottages that had been removed from the farm after it closed in the 1970's

There were originally fifteen cottages built in the village, with eight remaining on site (Molong cottage burnt down in 2022). Seven cottages were sold and moved to other locations. Mike Walker (Western Australia old Fairbridgian) during a visit in 2016 was able to locate the following, current use in brackets)

LILAC	In Molong
CANARY	In Garra (Burgess family)
BROWN	In Garra (Burgess Family)
GOWRIE	Near Yeoval (on Wellington Road)
RED	Main Street Cumnock (now a BNB)
CANNONBAR	Springwood (not correct see below)
ROSE	Unknown possibly near Queensland
CHAPEL	YEOVAL very forlorn (possibly not correct)

Recent research and correspondence to the Historical Society has added this information.

The CHAPEL, the materials from the Chapel were used to line the "Willow Park" Shearing Shed near Cumnock owned by the McKenzie family (newsletter Vol2 no7 2018)

ROSE COTTAGE It is believed there is a cottage in Dubbo, which has been renovated and transferred from Fairbridge. Is this ROSE COTTAGE? I am waiting on a reply (see Autumn 2026 newsletter)

CANNONBAR COTTAGE Purchased by the Warren Family and moved to their property "High Pael" at Isabella near Oberon. They sold the property in 1987 to the NSW Forestry Commission, except for the small house block. The house block of sixty acres was bought by Ken & Shirley Stapleton. There will be more about this cottage in a later newsletter.

MOLONG IN THE 70's

A GLANCE THROUGH OLD FILES

A selection of articles found in a 1903 Express

From Molong Express Saturday MAY 23, 1903,

July 18th 1879, At 2am on Wednesday 9th July instant, Mr H.V Leathem, founder and editor of the EXPRESS, passed away after a brief illness from acute bronchitis, aged 36 years. The deceased had caught a chill at the opening of the new Bowan Park School, and although every effort was made to ward off the inevitable by Drs Ross and Warren (Orange), their skill and attention was without avail and the patient passed quietly and peacefully at the hour stated.

Despite the bitterly cold rain the next day an immense cortege followed the remains to their last resting place in the Molong Cemetery, representative men attending from all parts of the electorate. The cortege was led by the members of the local Oddfellows Lodge of which the deceased was a member. The coffin was covered with a profusion of wreaths and floral tributes, and profound regret was expressed on every band at the untimely demise of one who had done so much for Molong and district in the few brief years of his residence here.

The deceased was a son of Mr J.E. Leathem of the Sydney Morning Herald and learned his trade under the late Sir Henry Parkes when the latter was proprietor of the "Empire". He, with a few other compositors stuck to Sir Henry-then plain Mr Parkes- when the latter's employees struck in a body and helped him to fetch out the "Empire" in the face of almost insurmountable difficulties. It was with anxiety, coupled with long hours he worked, during the strike that undermined deceased's constitution and left him an easy prey to the illness which ultimately laid him low. He conducted the "Gundagai Times" for over 12 years and only resigned his position there to start the MOLONG EXPRESS.

At a special meeting of Council last week, a vote of condolences was passed to the widow and family of the late editor of the EXPRESS.

VOLUNTEERS UPSKILLING WORKSHOPS

During this year several of our members have attended workshops to increase their knowledge.

COLLECTION WORKSHOP

An essential part of any museum is the conservation of the collection. To this end Jan, Lyndall & Susan participated in a "Collection Care & Basic Paper Conservation Workshop for Regional Museums". It was a 6 hour workshop offered by Create NSW and The Regional Sustainability Program and was well supported by representation from at least 6 regional museums. The workshop provided us with procedures and systems on how to conserve the paper portion of our collection, and included an emphasis on preventative damage measures. We also found the practical aspect of the workshop particularly helpful.

RAHS REGIONAL SEMINAR

Julie, Kim & John attended a RAHS Regional Seminar in Cowra recently. The programme included presentations "Using the Old Register for historical research and Land Records going back to 1791. Other presentations were Apprentice records, WW1 Soldiers Settlement Records, State Archives and NSW Railway staff. Speakers include Carol Liston & Christine Yates from the RAHS.

From Molong Express Saturday JUNE 6th, 1903, issue
TO THE EDITOR OF THE MOLONG EXPRESS

SIR-In reading your very interesting column of reminiscences of Molong in the 70's I may I have frequently reminded of many incidents of the past-some of which have almost been forgotten, while others as fresh in our memories as if they happened yesterday. Verily, time flies (or, as the Latin has its *Tempus Fugit*) and is an old man before he has time to realize that he is a young one.

Many of the incidents and happenings which you have resurrected from the almost forgotten limbo of the past are worth dilating upon, if only space permitted, and, although many of the actors in these stirring scenes of long ago have now passed away. I am pleased to say that there are among us some of the old timers who as hale and hearty as ever. Particularly does this refer to my old friend Mr William Tanner who, in the days to which you refer, was in a large way of business in Moong, a first-class townsman (there was none better) a though sportsman and a most genial spirit. He it was built and owned premises known a "Neilson's Glasgow Stores" and he it was who contested the several trotting matches to which you refer in the last EXPRESS. Mr Tanner and I had, I think of these contests as well as a few racing matches. Each of us owned a trotter and that the latter were a cut above the ordinary may be gauged from fact that both could do even time (three minutes) on the racecourse mile track) In saddle, 10st up. We had four matches to decide who premiership, and each of us had won two. Mr. Tanner, however, would have it that "his mare was the better horse" and so after all the excitement, sport etc which we already had he issued a challenge to a final contest, course from Bothorem Farm (Blakefield's) to the Freemason's Hotel for a tanner aside, owners up. The event duly came off, the writer's pony (Murphy) being returned a winner after a close race in a very fast time.

However, Mr Editor, my chief reason in referring to these trotting matches is with a view of finding out if others are likely to come off shortly. Some may be on the cards, and if so I may say as either Mr Tanner nor myself are engaged at present we might accept a mount, though I would certainly give the preference to my friend Mr Tanner.
